# Cheque Carefully

Before you attempt to cash a cheque, verify that it is valid and properly filled out. Look for the following elements:

- **Date** – The cheque must be dated on or before the day you present it. Post-dated cheques (future dates) may be rejected.
- **Payee line** – Your name (or the name of the person or business cashing it) must be clearly written. If the name is misspelled, ask the issuer to write a new cheque.
- **Amount in numbers and words** – Both should match. If they differ, the bank typically uses the written amount.
- **Signature** – The issuer's signature

must be present and appear genuine.

- **Check for alterations** – Any crossed-out or corrected information can make the cheque invalid.

If anything looks suspicious or incorrect, do not attempt to cash it. Return it to the issuer for a corrected replacement.

## 2. Decide Where to Cash Your Cheque

Your choice of location will greatly affect the speed, convenience, and fees involved. Here are the most common

places to cash a cheque:

### **YOUR OWN BANK OR CREDIT UNION**

If you have a checking or savings account, cashing a cheque at your own financial institution is almost always the cheapest and fastest option. Most banks and credit unions will cash cheques drawn on their own accounts for free. For cheques from other banks, they may charge a fee (usually a flat rate or a percentage of the cheque amount), but it is often lower than non-bank alternatives. You also get immediate access to the funds, sometimes with a small hold.

### **THE ISSUER'S BANK**

You can cash a cheque at the bank on which it is drawn, even if you are not a customer. The bank will verify the funds from the account instantly and pay you the full amount. However, expect to pay a fee (commonly \$5 to \$15) and provide two forms of identification. This method is very secure because the bank can confirm the cheque is genuine before handing over cash.

### **RETAIL STORES AND GROCERY CHAINS**

Many supermarkets, pharmacies, and big-box retailers (such as Walmart, Kroger, or CVS) offer cheque-cashing services. These are convenient because they have long hours and many

locations. The fees vary: Walmart, for example, typically charges a small flat fee (around \$4 for cheques up to \$1,000 and \$8 for larger amounts) but caps the maximum cheque amount. Others may charge a percentage (1-3%). Acceptable cheque types often include payroll, government, tax refund, and insurance settlement cheques. Personal cheques are rarely accepted.

### **CHEQUE-CASHING STORES**

Specialized cheque-cashing outlets (like ACE Cash Express or Money Mart) are widely available in urban areas. They can cash almost any type of cheque, including personal cheques, but they charge higher fees – sometimes up to 10% or more. Only use these as a last resort due to the cost. Additionally, they

may try to upsell you other financial products.

### **MOBILE CHECK DEPOSIT OR BANK APP**

If you have a smartphone and a bank account, you can use mobile check deposit and then withdraw cash from an ATM. While this is technically **depositing** the cheque, you can often access the full amount after a hold period (typically 1-2 business days). If you plan ahead, this is a free and extremely convenient alternative to cashing.

### 3. Endorse the Cheque Properly

Endorsement is the signature on the back of the cheque that authorizes the transfer of funds. Different endorsement methods suit different situations:

- **Blank endorsement** – Simply sign your name on the back. This allows anyone to cash or deposit the cheque, so it is risky if the cheque is lost. Only do this when you are at the teller window.
- **Restrictive endorsement** – Write “For deposit only to account # \_\_\_\_\_” and then sign. This prevents anyone else from cashing

the cheque and is safest for deposits.

- **Special endorsement** – Write “Pay to the order of [another person’s name]” and then sign. This allows you to transfer the cheque to a third party (like a friend or family member). Note that not all banks allow third-party endorsement for cashing.

For cashing purposes, a blank endorsement is typical, but only add your signature when you are at the counter. Never sign a cheque before you are ready to present it.

## 4. Gather Your Identification

Almost every location will require at least one form of government-issued photo ID, such as a driver's license, passport, or state ID card. For non-customers cashing a cheque at a bank, they may ask for a second form of identification (like a credit card or utility bill). Be prepared with two IDs to avoid rejection. Also, ensure the name on the ID matches the payee name on the cheque exactly. If you have a different name (e.g., due to marriage), bring documentation (marriage certificate) to prove the link.

## 5. Be Prepared to Pay Fees

Understand exactly what you will be charged before you hand over the cheque. Ask for a fee schedule or have the cashier explain it. Fees are usually disclosed in writing. Common structures include:

- **Flat fee** – A set amount per cheque (e.g., \$3 for cheques up to \$500).
- **Percentage** – A small percentage of the cheque amount (e.g., 1% for payroll cheques, up to 3% for personal cheques).
- **Minimum fee** – Even with a

percentage, there is often a minimum fee (e.g., \$1 minimum).

Take a moment to calculate whether it is worth cashing the cheque or if depositing it and waiting a day would save you money.

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## Payroll Cheques

Employer-issued payroll cheques are among the easiest to cash. Many retail stores accept them, and banks generally trust them. However, some employers now use direct deposit, so if you receive a paper payroll cheque, ensure it is from a legitimate employer. Beware of

overpayment scams where a fake employer sends a cheque for too much and asks you to refund the difference.

## Government Cheques

Cheques from the IRS, Social Security, or state agencies are considered very secure. Many places waive fees for government cheques or charge lower rates. They are also widely accepted by retailers and banks. You will still need ID, but the verification is straightforward.

## Personal Cheques

Personal cheques from friends or family are the most difficult to cash, especially if you do not have an account. Banks often impose holds of several days for funds to clear. Cheque-cashing stores may accept personal cheques but will charge steep fees and may require additional verification. If possible, ask the person to issue a cashier's cheque or money order instead, which is guaranteed.

## Cashier's Cheques and Money Orders

Cashier's cheques are drawn on a bank's own funds, so they are essentially equivalent to cash. You can cash them at the issuing bank for free, and many banks will cash them for non-customers with a small fee. Money orders are similar but issued by post offices, supermarkets, or financial services – they can be cashed at the location that issued them.

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## WHEN CASHING A CHEQUE

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- **Always call ahead** – Not all branches or stores offer cheque cashing, especially for non-customers. Call to confirm hours, fees, and acceptable cheque types.
- **Bring the right identification** – Check what forms are accepted. Some places require a thumbprint or fingerprint as an anti-fraud measure.
- **Consider opening a bank account** – If you regularly receive cheques, a basic checking account eliminates many fees and hold times. Even second-chance accounts can be helpful.

- **Use mobile deposit wisely** – If you can wait 1–2 days, mobile deposit is free and you can then withdraw cash from an ATM.
- **Avoid cheque-cashing stores if possible** – Their convenience comes at a high cost. Use them only for emergencies or when no other option exists.
- **Watch for scams** – Never cash a cheque for someone you don't know and then wire them the money. That is a classic fake cheque scam.
- **Keep the receipt** – Always ask for a transaction receipt showing the cheque amount, fee, and cash given. This protects you if there is a dispute.

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## **WHAT TO DO IF YOUR CHEQUE IS LOST OR STOLEN**

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If you have endorsed a cheque and it goes missing, immediately contact the issuing bank or the person who wrote the cheque to request a stop payment. You will need the cheque number and exact amount. The issuer can then cancel the original and issue a replacement. If your cheque was cashed fraudulently, report it to the bank and local police. This is why you should never sign a blank endorsement until you are at the cashier.
