COMMON TOPICS COVERED IN SAMPLE MATH PLACEMENT TESTS

- **Inequalities:** solving and graphing on a number line
- **Exponents and square roots:** basic rules, evaluating square roots of perfect squares
- **Coordinate geometry:** plotting points, slope, intercepts

Example: Solve for x : $3(x + 2) = 15$.
Answer: $x = 3$

Intermediate Algebra

This section often determines whether you need remedial courses or can enter college-level math. Topics include:

- **Factoring polynomials:** greatest

common factor, trinomials, difference of squares

- **Rational expressions:** simplifying, adding, subtracting, multiplying, dividing
- **Radicals:** simplifying radicals, rationalizing denominators
- **Quadratic equations:** solving by factoring, quadratic formula, completing the square
- **Systems of equations:** solving by substitution or elimination

Example: Factor completely: $x^2 - 5x + 6$.
Answer: $(x - 2)(x - 3)$

Geometry and Advanced Topics (if applicable)

Some placement tests, especially those for STEM programs, include basic geometry and problem-solving. You may see:

- **Perimeter, area, and volume** of common shapes
- **Properties of angles** (complementary, supplementary, vertical)
- **Pythagorean theorem**
- **Basic trigonometry** (sine, cosine, tangent – rarely, but possible)
- **Functions:** evaluating, domain and range, graphing linear and quadratic functions

Example: A right triangle has legs of length 3 and 4. What is the length of the hypotenuse? **Answer:** 5

HOW TO USE A SAMPLE MATH PLACEMENT TEST EFFECTIVELY

Simply taking a **sample math**

placement test for community college once and glancing at the answers will not help much. To get the most benefit, follow this strategy:

1. **Simulate test conditions.** Find a quiet place, set a timer (usually 60–90 minutes for the full test), and avoid using a calculator unless the test allows it for certain sections.
2. **Do not guess wildly.** If you do not know an answer, skip it and move on. This will give you a realistic picture of which topics you truly understand.

INTERPRETING YOUR PLACEMENT TEST RESULTS

Many students place into developmental math and still go on to earn degrees in engineering, nursing, and business. Use your results as a roadmap, not a judgment.

STRATEGIES TO IMPROVE YOUR MATH SKILLS BEFORE THE TEST
