Step 1: Make a Slip Knot

Every crochet project begins with a slip knot. This knot attaches the yarn to the hook securely. To make a slip knot:

1. Leaving a tail of about 6 inches, wrap the yarn around your index and middle fingers twice.
2. Pull the first loop over the second loop, then pull the working yarn to form a loop.

3. Insert your crochet hook into the loop, and gently pull the working yarn to tighten the knot around the hook. It should slide easily but not be too tight.

Step 2: Master the Chain Stitch (ch)

The chain stitch is the foundation of most crochet projects. It creates a row of linked loops that other stitches are worked into. To make a chain:

1. Hold the hook in your dominant hand and the yarn in your other hand. The working yarn should go over your index finger and be held loosely between your thumb and middle finger.
2. Bring the yarn over the hook from back to front (this is called “yarn over”).
3. Rotate the hook slightly, and pull the yarn through the loop already on the hook. One chain stitch is complete.
4. Repeat to create a series of chains. Aim for a consistent tension—not too tight, not too loose. Practice making a chain of 20 stitches.

This simple action forms the skeleton of your work. Once you can control the tension, you are ready to progress.

Step 3: Learn the Single Crochet (sc)

Single crochet is the most basic stitch and a fundamental part of any **step by step how to crochet** curriculum. It creates a dense, sturdy fabric. Here's how to work single crochet into a chain:

1. Insert your hook into the second chain from the hook (skip the loop on the hook).
2. Yarn over and pull the yarn back through the chain. You now have two loops on your hook.
3. Yarn over again and pull the yarn through both loops on the hook. One single crochet is complete.
4. Continue across the chain, making one single crochet in each chain. At the end, turn your work and make a turning chain of one chain stitch before starting the next row.

Step 4: Attempt the Double Crochet (dc)

Double crochet is taller than single crochet and makes fabric that works up faster. It's ideal for blankets and shawls. Follow these steps:

1. Yarn over first, then insert your hook into the fourth chain from the hook (this accounts for the height of the stitch).
2. Yarn over and pull through the chain. You now have three loops on the hook.
3. Yarn over and pull through the first two loops on the hook. Two loops remain.
4. Yarn over again and pull through the remaining two loops. One double crochet is done.
5. Work across the row, turning with a chain of three at the end.

The double crochet stitch adds height and openness to your fabric. Once you master single and double crochet, you have the tools to attempt most beginner patterns.

FINISHING YOUR WORK: TYING OFF AND WEAVING ENDS

Completing a piece is satisfying, but you must secure the yarn properly to prevent unraveling. Whether you are practicing a swatch or finishing a scarf, here is the proper method:

- **Fastening off:** After your last stitch, cut the yarn leaving a tail of about 6 inches. Yarn over and pull the tail completely through the loop on your hook. Pull gently to tighten. This creates a knot.
- **Weaving in ends:** Thread the tail onto a yarn needle. Insert the needle through the back of several stitches along the edge. Change direction once to lock the yarn in. Trim any excess close to the fabric.

This final step in the **step by step how to crochet** process gives your work a

professional finish and ensures durability.

- **st(s)** – stitch(es)
- **rep** – repeat
- **inc** – increase
- **dec** – decrease

Patterns also include gauge measurements and often a suggested hook size. Start with a simple pattern labeled “beginner” or “easy.” A scarf made entirely of single or double crochet is a perfect first project. As you gain experience, you can try circles (for hats or coasters) which require working in the round.

Increasing and Decreasing

Shaping your crochet work involves adding or subtracting stitches. To

increase, simply work two stitches into the same stitch. To **decrease** in single crochet, insert your hook into the next stitch, yarn over and pull through (two loops), then insert into the following stitch, yarn over and pull through (three loops), then yarn over and pull through all three loops. This combines two stitches into one. Mastering increases and decreases allows you to create curved shapes like sleeves, hats, and amigurumi animals.

PRO TIPS FOR A SMOOTH CROCHET EXPERIENCE

Even with clear **step by step how to crochet** instructions, beginners often encounter common hiccups. Here are expert tips to overcome them:

- **Keep your tension light but even.** If your stitches are too tight, the hook will be hard to insert. If too loose, the fabric will look messy. Practice makes perfect.
