Part B: Select the sentence from the passage that best supports your answer to Part A.

- "They feared the unknown but trusted their captain."
- "Without a word, they plugged their ears with beeswax and bound him tighter."
- "Odysseus wept in frustration as the song grew faint."
- "The crew argued among themselves before agreeing to his plan."

Answer Key: Part A: B. Odysseus commands and they obey. Part B: "Without a word, they plugged their ears with beeswax and bound him tighter." This shows immediate, obedient action.

Sample Question 3

(Multiselect)

Question: Which two of the following statements best identify the central themes of the passage?

1. Great leaders make decisions alone.
2. Curiosity must be balanced with caution.
3. Teamwork is sometimes necessary for survival.
4. All monsters can be defeated through strength.

Correct Answers: 2 and 3. Odysseus balances his own curiosity with the safety of the ship, and he relies on his crew to succeed.

STRATEGIES FOR ANSWERING FSA ELA QUESTIONS ON THIS PASSAGE

To maximize your performance on **Fsa Ela Reading Practice Test Questions Odysseus And The Sirens**, adopt these proven strategies:

Read the Passage Carefully, Then Read It

Again

Do not rush. The FSA ELA is not a speed-reading contest. Read the passage once to understand the story and a second time to identify key details. Underline or highlight phrases that seem important, such as “tied to the mast,” “filled the air,” and “ached with longing.”

Annotate the Text

Eliminate Wrong Answers

For multiple-choice questions, cross out options that are clearly wrong. If an answer includes extreme language like “always” or “never,” it is often incorrect. Also, discard options that are true in a general sense but not supported by the specific passage. For instance, saying “Odysseus was brave” might be true, but if the question asks about his primary motivation in this scene, “bravery” may not be the best answer if the passage focuses more on his curiosity.

Pay Attention to Vocabulary in Context

When you see a vocabulary question, do not simply rely on your memory of the word. Re-read the sentence in which the word appears and the two sentences surrounding it. Ask yourself: “What is happening here? What tone is being set?” This will help you choose the correct definition. For example, the word “enthraling” in the context of the Sirens’ song means “captivating” but with a dangerous undertone, not simply “pleasant.”

Practice with a Timer

For a narrative passage like Odysseus and the Sirens, reading the story first usually yields better comprehension.
