CEO or Entrepreneur

A sharp suit or blazer, a tie, and dress shoes. Carry a briefcase or a tablet. Add a fake nameplate that says "CEO" or "Founder." You can also include a toy phone to take "important calls." This is a powerful way to introduce young students to leadership and business concepts.

Lawyer or Judge

For a lawyer: a suit and tie, plus a briefcase and a gavel (optional). For a judge: a black robe (easily made from a trash bag or fabric) and a gavel. A toy law book or a written "objection" sign adds humor. These **career day dress up ideas** can lead to lively discussions about justice and debate.

Banker or Stockbroker

A vest, a tie, and a calculator on a belt. Carry play money or a small binder with "financial reports." This is an excellent way to demystify money management

for children.

SKILLED TRADES AND HANDS-ON PROFESSIONS

Firefighter

A yellow or red plastic helmet, a yellow raincoat or jacket, and boots. Carry a toy hose or a walkie-talkie. Many kids love this heroic role, and it's easy to put together with gear from a costume shop or even a thrift store.

Construction

Worker

A hard hat, a reflective vest, work gloves, and a tool belt with plastic tools. Wear jeans and a sturdy shirt. This authentic look is one of the most durable and comfortable **career day dress up ideas**, especially for active students.

Chef

A chef's coat (or white button-down), a chef hat (toque), and an apron. Carry a wooden spoon, a whisk, and a small pot or a cookbook. You can even glue fake food onto the apron for a fun twist.

Astronaut

Robotics Engineer

Wear a collared shirt with a pocket protector. Attach a small cardboard robot or a broken electronic toy to your

belt. Carry a tablet and wear safety glasses. This modern STEM career is easy to adapt and showcases the future of technology.

Marine Biologist

Khaki shorts, a safari shirt, and a hat. Carry a small net, a magnifying glass, and a water bottle. Pin plastic sea creatures to your shirt or hat. This is a great option for outdoorsy kids who love the ocean.

PUBLIC SERVICE AND COMMUNITY ROLES

Police Officer

A dark blue or black uniform shirt, badge (use a toy or paper one), and a toy walkie-talkie. A cap and toy handcuffs (safe ones) can be added. Emphasize community service and helping people. Always avoid fake weapons.

A cardigan, glasses (fake or real), and a tie. Carry a chalkboard eraser, a stack of books, and an apple. This profession is familiar to every student and can be a fun way to reverse roles.

Librarian

A cardigan, a skirt or slacks, glasses on a chain, and a bun hairstyle (if applicable). Carry a "shush" sign or a book with a bookmark. This gentle, bookish look is perfect for quiet, thoughtful students.

ACCESSORIES AND PROPS THAT ELEVATE ANY LOOK
