HOW TO USE A PAPER SHOE TEMPLATE: A STEP-BY-STEP GUIDE

Step 2: Cut Out the Pieces Carefully

Take your time with this step. Carefully cut along the solid outer lines of each template piece. If your template has small or intricate details, consider using a craft knife for greater precision. It is always better to cut slightly outside the line than inside it, as you can always

trim away excess paper later. A ragged cut will make the assembly process much more difficult and will detract from the final appearance of your shoe.

Step 3: Score the Fold Lines

This is a crucial step that many beginners skip. Using your bone folder or the back of a spoon, gently press down along the dashed or dotted fold lines. This process, called scoring, creates a small indentation in the paper. This indentation weakens the paper fibers along the line, making it much easier to create a straight, crisp fold. Without scoring, your folds will likely be crooked or rough.

Step 4: Fold Along the Scored Lines

Once you have scored all the required lines, begin folding the paper along those indentations. Use your bone folder to press the fold flat. Pay close attention to the direction of the fold. Some folds will be mountain folds (folding the paper upward toward you) and others will be valley folds (folding the paper downward away from you). The template instructions should indicate which direction is required.

Step 5: Assemble the Shoe

Start attaching the pieces together using the glue tabs. Work systematically, following the instructions provided with your specific template. A common technique is to assemble the upper part of the shoe first, attaching the sides to the toe cap and heel. Then, carefully attach the assembled upper to the sole piece. Hold each glued section in place for a few moments to ensure a strong bond. Patience is key here; rushing the assembly can lead to a lopsided or collapsed shoe.

Step 6: Decorate and Personalize

Now comes the fun part. Once your paper shoe is fully assembled and the glue has dried, you can decorate it to your heart's content. Paint it with acrylics, cover it with patterned paper, add ribbons, beads, or sequins. The paper shoe template is your canvas.
