The letter should avoid excessive flattery. While the tone should be positive and supportive, it must also feel genuine and balanced. Over-the-top language can sometimes raise doubts. A sincere, matter-of-fact description of the student's strengths is far more persuasive.

EAGLE SCOUT RECOMMENDATION LETTER SAMPLE FROM A TEACHER

Ask the Scout for a "Brag Sheet"

A good scout will make your job easier. Ask the scout to provide a brief summary of their Scouting accomplishments, their Eagle project, and a few specific memories from your class that they think are relevant. This helps you avoid guessing and ensures you highlight what matters most to their application.

Focus on the Recent Years

While a long history is nice, the board is most interested in the scout's current maturity and character. Focus on your interactions with them in the last year or two. Recent observations are more relevant than stories from when they were a freshman.

Be Honest and Measured

If you have seen moments of struggle or growth, it is okay to mention them in a positive light. For example, "I saw John struggle with group dynamics early in the year, but he learned to listen more carefully and became a more effective collaborator." This shows growth, which is a sign of maturity.

Keep it Professional and Concise

The letter should be one page, single-spaced, at most. The board reads many letters. A clear, concise, and well-organized letter is more impactful than a lengthy essay. Use standard business letter format.

COMMON MISTAKES TO AVOID

Understanding what *not* to do is just as important as knowing what to do. Here are a few pitfalls to avoid when writing an Eagle Scout recommendation letter.

- **Vague Praise:** Avoid phrases like "He is a great kid" or "She is a wonderful student." These are meaningless without evidence.
- **Focusing Only on Grades:** While good grades are nice, the board cares more about character and leadership. A student with average grades but exceptional character is often a stronger candidate.
- **Comparing the Scout to Others:** Avoid saying "They are the best student I have ever had." This can seem exaggerated. Instead, focus on their unique qualities.
- **Ignoring the Scout Law:** The letter does not have to be a checklist, but ignoring the core values of Scouting makes the letter feel disconnected from the purpose of the review.
- **Being Too Short:** A single paragraph is not enough. You need to provide enough detail to paint a full picture of the student.
