For larger numbers, like 47×52 , you can use a technique called **rounding and adjusting**. Think of 52 as $50 + 2$. So, $47 \times 50 = 2350$, and $47 \times 2 = 94$. The total is 2444. 3. The Magic of Squaring

Numbers Ending in 5

3. **Step 3:** Multiply the differences: $(-3) \times (-4) = 12$. This gives the second part.
4. **Final Result:** 9312. This is the correct answer, and it takes seconds to compute.

This method works for numbers slightly above 100 as well. For 103×104 , the differences are +3 and +4. Cross-add: $103 + 4 = 107$. Multiply differences: $3 \times 4 = 12$. The answer is 10712. It is a fast, reliable secret weapon for a specific but common scenario.
