The miniseries was shot on location in Hungary, Austria, and Canada, with the iconic Cathedral of the Assumption

in Székesfehérvár standing in for the fictional Kingsbridge Cathedral. The production design, overseen by Michael Joy, immersed viewers in the grim, muddy, yet majestic world of the Middle Ages. The result was a production that felt both intimate in its character moments and sweeping in its historical scope.
