Verbal Analogy Example: *FISH : SCHOOL ::*

- A) bird : flock
- B) wolf : pack
- C) bee : hive
- D) tree : forest
- E) ship : fleet

Strategy: Identify the relationship. A group of fish is a school. You need the same relationship: a group of something. Options A, B, C, D, and E all describe groups, but the best answer is the one with the same level of specificity. Bird : flock (group of birds), wolf : pack (group of wolves), bee : hive (group of bees), tree : forest (group of trees), ship : fleet (group of ships). All are correct groups, but the typical analogy expects the most common pairing. In this case, “fish: school” is a classic pair like “bird: flock” or “wolf: pack”. However, note that the AFOQT may have multiple seemingly correct answers; you must choose the one that most closely mirrors the relationship.

Arithmetic Reasoning Example: A train travels 240 miles in 4 hours. If it

increases its speed by 10 miles per hour, how long will it take to travel the same distance?

Strategy: First, find the original speed: $240 \text{ miles} \div 4 \text{ hours} = 60 \text{ mph}$. New speed = $60 + 10 = 70 \text{ mph}$. Time = $\text{distance} \div \text{speed} = 240 \div 70 \approx 3.43$ hours, or about 3 hours and 26 minutes. Practice mental math and fraction conversions to save time.

Aviation Information Example: What is the primary purpose of the rudder on an aircraft?

- A) Control roll
- B) Control pitch
- C) Control yaw
- D) Increase lift

Strategy: The rudder is located on the vertical stabilizer and controls yaw

(left-right movement of the nose). Memorize the three primary flight controls: ailerons (roll), elevator (pitch), and rudder (yaw). Many aviation questions rely on basic definitions.
