WHO WAS MARTYN LLOYD-JONES? THE MAN BEHIND THE COMMENTARY

Martyn Lloyd-Jones (1899–1981) was a medical doctor who abandoned a promising career in medicine to enter the Christian ministry. He became the pastor of a small Welsh church before being called to Westminster Chapel in London in 1939, where he preached until his retirement in 1968.

Lloyd-Jones was known for his expository preaching—a method of taking a passage of Scripture and explaining it systematically, verse by verse, with careful attention to its original meaning and contemporary application. He rejected the trend toward topical

preaching that he believed often bypassed the difficult parts of Scripture. Instead, he insisted that the preacher's task was to open the text and let it speak for itself.

His approach to Romans was no exception. From 1955 to 1968, he devoted his Friday night Bible studies to a detailed exposition of Paul's letter. These sessions were open to the public and attracted hundreds of listeners who came week after week to hear the Word expounded with clarity and power. The recordings were later transcribed and published as the now-famous **Martyn Lloyd Jones Romans Commentary** series.

A Unique Blend of Doctor and Preacher

Lloyd-Jones's medical training gave him a keen analytical mind, which he brought to bear on the biblical text. He was not content with superficial readings. He asked hard questions: What does this verse mean in its original context? How does it connect to the surrounding argument? What does it reveal about God, humanity, and salvation? At the same time, his pastoral heart meant that he never allowed theology to become abstract. He constantly applied the text to the lives of his hearers, addressing their doubts, fears, and struggles with the gospel.

- **God's Sovereign Purpose** (Romans 9-10)
- **The Remnant of Grace** (Romans 11)
- **The Christian Life** (Romans 12-13)
- **Christian Unity** (Romans 14-15)
- **The Love of God** (Romans 8—a standalone volume on that chapter)

As the list indicates, the commentary covers Romans 1 through 14 in exhaustive detail. Unfortunately, Lloyd-Jones did not live to complete the work on chapters 15 and 16, though his existing material on those chapters is available in recorded form. Even so, the scope of what remains is breathtaking.

Verse-by-Verse Exposition

The hallmark of the **Martyn Lloyd Jones Romans Commentary** is its meticulous verse-by-verse approach. Lloyd-Jones believed that every word of Scripture was inspired by God and therefore worthy of careful study. He would often spend an entire evening exploring the meaning of a single phrase, unpacking its theological implications and showing how it fit into Paul's larger argument.

For example, in his exposition of Romans 8:28—"And we know that all things work together for good to those who love God, to those who are called according to His purpose"—Lloyd-Jones devotes an entire chapter to the word "know." He distinguishes between intellectual assent and the deep, experiential certainty that comes from the Holy Spirit. This kind of careful attention to the text is characteristic of the entire series.

KEY THEOLOGICAL THEMES IN THE COMMENTARY

Throughout the **Martyn Lloyd Jones Romans Commentary**, several major theological themes emerge. These are not merely academic interests for Lloyd-Jones; they are the living truths that animate the Christian life.

The Sovereignty of God

He carefully distinguishes between justification—the legal declaration that the sinner is righteous in God's sight through faith in Christ—and sanctification, the process by which the believer is made morally holy. He warns against confusing the two, insisting that justification is a complete and finished work, while sanctification is a progressive work that continues throughout life.

His exposition of Romans 3–4 is particularly valuable for those who struggle to understand how faith alone can be the basis of our acceptance with God. He shows that this is not a new idea but the consistent teaching of the Old Testament, as demonstrated in the life of Abraham.

The Life of the Spirit

Lloyd-Jones's treatment of Romans 8 is widely regarded as one of the finest expositions of this chapter ever written. He devotes multiple volumes to it, exploring every aspect of the Spirit's work in the believer's life. He emphasizes that the Christian life is not a matter of trying harder but of walking in the power of the Holy Spirit. He addresses the assurance of salvation, the role of suffering, and the certainty of future glory with a combination of theological precision and pastoral warmth that is rare in any era.

The Place of the Law

In his exposition of Romans 7, Lloyd-Jones tackles the vexed question of the law's role in the Christian life. He argues that the law is good and holy but that it cannot save or sanctify. Its purpose is to drive us to Christ, to expose our sin, and to show us our need for grace. The believer is free from the law as a means of salvation but still called to fulfill the law through love, empowered by the Spirit.

This nuanced view of the law avoids both legalism and antinomianism, offering a balanced biblical perspective that is desperately needed in the contemporary church.

WHAT MAKES THIS COMMENTARY DIFFERENT FROM OTHERS?

There are many excellent commentaries on Romans, from the

scholarly works of Douglas Moo and Thomas Schreiner to the devotional insights of John Stott. So what sets the **Martyn Lloyd Jones Romans Commentary** apart?

1. **It is preached, not written.** The spoken word has a different quality than the written word. Lloyd-Jones is not merely informing his hearers; he is pleading with them, warning them, encouraging them, and calling them to respond. This gives the commentary a sense of urgency and immediacy that is often missing from more academic works.

4. **It is pastoral.** For all its theological depth, the commentary is never cold or theoretical. Lloyd-Jones constantly applies the text to the lives of his hearers. He addresses their fears, their doubts, and their struggles with the gospel. He is a physician of the soul as well as a teacher of the mind.

THE LASTING IMPACT AND RELEVANCE

Decades after they were first delivered, the expositions that make up the **Martyn Lloyd Jones Romans Commentary** continue to bless readers around the world. They have been translated into multiple languages and are widely available in print, digital, and audio formats.
