- **7.5 cm x 7.5 cm (3 inches):** Often used for miniatures, jewelry, or practice folds. Ideal for simple models like cranes or stars when you want to create a set of tiny decorations.

- **35 cm x 35 cm (14 inches) and larger:** Reserved for master-level folders and exhibition pieces. Large squares allow for intricate geometric patterns, multi-step sequences, and dramatic final displays.

Some specialty brands also produce squares as small as 2.5 cm or as large as 1 meter square. The latter is extremely rare and usually custom-cut for large installation art or stage props.

NON-STANDARD AND SPECIALTY ORIGAMI PAPER SIZES

Not all origami paper is square. While squares dominate traditional origami, many contemporary folders and designers work with **rectangular**, **hexagonal**, or even **circular** sheets. Understanding these formats expands your creative possibilities.

Rectangular Origami Paper

Rectangular paper is essential for certain folding styles, most notably **money origami** (using dollar bills, which are 2.61 x 6.14 inches) and **letter-sized** (8.5 x 11 inches) paper projects. Many classic models, such as the traditional origami box or some action models, start from a rectangle rather than a square.

Common rectangular sizes include:

- **A4 (210 mm x 297 mm):** Used extensively in Europe for diagrams and practice. Many origami designers provide instructions based on A4 paper because it is a standard office paper size worldwide.
- **US Letter (8.5 x 11 inches):** Similar to A4 but slightly wider and shorter. This size is typical for North American folders using printer paper.
- **2:1 rectangles:** Created by cutting a square in half. These are common for modular units or simple booklets.
- **1:3 or 1:4 rectangles:** Used for specific models like the **Japanese brocade** or **phizz units**.

Non-Square Polygons and Circles

While less common, origami artists sometimes use **hexagons** for models like snowflakes or flowers, and **octagons** for certain tessellations. **Circular origami** is an advanced niche where a circle is folded into complex spirals and curved shapes. These papers are typically hand-cut by the folder

from larger sheets.

HOW PAPER SIZE AFFECTS YOUR ORIGAMI EXPERIENCE

Choosing the right size is not arbitrary—it directly impacts your success and enjoyment. Here are key factors to consider when deciding **what is the size of origami paper** for your specific project:

Complexity and Detail

Complex models with many folds require larger paper because each fold consumes paper thickness. A 50-step dragon designed by a master might need a sheet of at least 30 cm to maintain proportion and avoid tearing. Conversely, a simple cup or boat can be folded from a 10 cm square without difficulty.

Paper Thickness and Fiber

Thicker papers, such as **tant** (a dense, matte paper) or **kraft**, hold shape better but are harder to fold tightly in small sizes. Consider where your finished model will be placed. A tiny crane looks charming on a desk, but a large heron made from 40 cm paper becomes a statement piece. Similarly, if you plan to hang your origami, larger, lighter papers may be better to avoid drooping.

CHOOSING THE RIGHT ORIGAMI PAPER SIZE FOR BEGINNERS

For those just starting out, the best advice is to stick with the standard **15 cm x 15 cm (6-inch) square**. This size is forgiving, widely available in craft stores and online, and matches most instructional diagrams. Beginners should also look for paper that is thin but not too flimsy, such as standard **origami kami** or even plain printer paper cut into squares.

As you gain confidence, try the following progression:

1. **Step 1:** Master simple models (crane, frog, airplane) using 15 cm paper.
2. **Step 2:** Move to intermediate models (box, flower, simple animal) with 20 cm paper to accommodate extra folds.
3. **Step 3:** Try modular or wet-folded models using 25 cm paper or larger.
4. **Step 4:** Experiment with rectangles and non-square papers for variety.
