
We Shall Fight On The Beaches

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INTRODUCTION: THE RESOUNDING ECHO OF DEFIANCE

Some phrases transcend their immediate historical moment to become timeless symbols of courage and resolve. **We Shall Fight On The Beaches** is precisely such a phrase.
