STEP-BY-STEP GUIDE: HOW TO DRAW LOONEY TUNES CHARACTERS

Drawing Bugs Bunny: The Star of the Show

Bugs Bunny is arguably the most iconic Looney Tunes character. His laid-back attitude and quick wit are reflected in his relaxed posture and confident expression. Follow these steps to learn **how to draw Looney Tunes** starting with Bugs:

Drawing Daffy Duck: The Energetic Antagonist

Daffy Duck is the perfect foil to Bugs Bunny. He is loud, impulsive, and full of chaotic energy. Capturing his personality through drawing requires emphasis on his expressive eyes and flamboyant movements. Here is how to approach **how to draw Looney Tunes** with Daffy:

- Refine the expression:** Daffy's expression is crucial. Make his eyebrows sharp and angled to show his agitated state. His bill should look slightly open, as if he is about to start a rant.

Drawing Tweety Bird: Small but Mighty

Tweety Bird is a tiny yellow canary who always manages to outsmart the predatory Sylvester the Cat. Drawing Tweety requires attention to roundness and innocence. To master **how to draw Looney Tunes** with Tweety, focus on the following:

- Start with a circle for the head:** Tweety's head is very large in proportion to his body. This is what makes him look cute and vulnerable.
- Draw the body:** The body is a small, round oval beneath the head. It should look soft and plump.
- Add the huge eyes:** Tweety's eyes are enormous, taking up a large portion of his face. They are innocent and slightly wide-open. Draw them as large circles with tiny pupils in the center.
