MASTERING MATH THROUGH PRACTICAL APPLICATION: THE VALUE OF A SOLVING PROPORTIONS WORD PROBLEMS WORKSHEET

Common Mistakes and How to Avoid Them

A student might write $3/1.50 = x/10$ when the problem asks for the cost of 10 apples, setting up a false equivalence. The correct setup is $3/1.50 = 10/x$. Rounding errors also appear, especially when working with money or decimals. Encourage students to keep their work precise until the final step and then round appropriately according to the problem context.
