Romance Languages (Western Europe & The Americas)

Germanic Languages (Northern & Central Europe)

- **Norwegian:** *Takk* (tahk). The standard form. "Thank you very much" is *Tusen takk* (TOO-sen tahk), which means "a thousand thanks."

Slavic & Baltic Languages (Eastern Europe)

Asian Languages (East & Southeast Asia)

- **Korean:** *Gamsahamnida* (gahm-sah-hahm-nee-dah). This is the standard, polite, and formal "thank you," used in most situations. In a very informal setting with close friends, you can say *Gomawo* (goh-mah-woh). "Thank you very much" is *Jeongmal gamsahamnida* (juhng-mahl gahm-sah-hahm-nee-dah).
- **Thai:** *Khàawp-khun* (kâwp-koon). The tone is crucial here. It is a falling tone. Men should add *khruap* (krúp) at the end (making it *Khàawp-khun khruap*), and women should add *kâ* (kâh) at the end (making
