5. **Include relevant context.** If something was unusual about the lighting, the noise level, or the behaviour of the people involved, mention it. Context helps investigators and lawyers assess reliability.
6. **Review and correct.** After writing the draft, read it aloud to check for clarity. Correct any spelling or grammar errors that could cause confusion. However, do not alter the facts to make them “better” or more helpful to one side.
7. **Sign and date.** A blank witness statement only becomes a valid legal document when it is signed and dated. If a notary or witness to the signature is required, arrange that as well.

LEGAL CONSIDERATIONS WHEN USING A BLANK WITNESS STATEMENT

In many legal systems, a witness statement may later be used as evidence in court or during a deposition. Therefore, it is essential to handle the document with care from the moment it is created.

Preserving Originality
