emerged from the data. This is not a simple list of quotes. Instead, you should organize the findings around key themes, using direct quotations from the interview to illustrate each point. A well-designed **sample interview paper in APA format** will show you how to introduce a theme, state it clearly, and then support it with one or two well-chosen quotes. References

All sources cited in your paper must appear in the reference list, formatted according to APA 7th edition rules. Note that personal interviews are not included in the reference list in APA style. Instead, they are cited only as personal communications within the text. However, if you used a published transcript of an interview, that source would be listed. will demonstrate this distinction clearly.

Mistake One: Treating the Interview Transcrip t as the Paper

Your paper is not a transcript. A common error is to present large blocks of

Findings: Three themes emerged: boundary management, social isolation, and productivity fluctuations. Under "boundary management," the author writes: "The participant described the challenge of separating work and home life, stating, 'I found myself answering emails at 10 PM because my laptop was right there' (personal

communication, June 20, 2025). This quote illustrates the difficulty of maintaining clear boundaries when the office is in the living room."

Discussion: The author connects these themes to existing literature on work-life balance, noting that the participant's experience aligns with broader trends but also highlights the role of personality in adaptation. Limitations include the single-participant design. The paper concludes with suggestions for employers to provide clearer remote work guidelines.

References: A list of academic sources cited in the introduction and discussion, formatted in APA style. The interview itself is not listed.

This walkthrough gives you a concrete sense of how a **sample interview paper in APA format** brings together structure, content, and style.
