- **1938:** Germany annexes Austria (Anschluss) and, later that year, the Sudetenland region of Czechoslovakia following the Munich Agreement, a policy of appeasement by Britain and France.

The Final Steps to War (1939)

In March 1939, Hitler violated the Munich Agreement by occupying the rest of Czechoslovakia. Britain and France, finally abandoning appeasement, pledged to defend Poland. The stage was set. The **Timeline Of The Second World War** officially begins with the signing of the Molotov-Ribbentrop Pact, a non-aggression treaty between Germany and the Soviet Union that secretly divided Eastern Europe into spheres of influence.

1. **August 23, 1939:** Nazi-Soviet Pact signed.
2. **September 1, 1939:** Germany invades Poland without a declaration of war, using blitzkrieg tactics.
3. **September 3, 1939:** Britain and France declare war on Germany. The Second World War has begun.

THE WAR EXPANDS: THE AXIS ON THE OFFENSIVE (1939-1941)

The first two years of the **Timeline Of The Second World War** are characterized by rapid and stunning German victories. Using combined arms warfare, the Wehrmacht swept across Europe with terrifying speed.

The Fall of Western Europe

After a period of relative quiet known as the "Phoney War," Germany struck west in May 1940. Denmark and Norway fell quickly. Then, in a daring maneuver through the Ardennes Forest, German forces bypassed the heavily fortified Maginot Line, trapping Allied forces in Belgium. The British Expeditionary Force was forced into a desperate evacuation from the beaches of Dunkirk.

By June 1940, France had surrendered. The nation was divided into a German-occupied zone and a collaborationist regime in Vichy. Britain now stood alone against Hitler. The Battle of Britain, fought in the skies above England, became a pivotal air campaign. The Royal Air Force's victory forced Hitler to indefinitely postpone Operation Sea Lion, the planned invasion of Britain.

War in the Mediterranean and the Balkans

Italy, seeking to build its own empire, opened fronts in North Africa and Greece. However, Italian forces struggled, requiring German intervention. The Afrika Korps, led by General Erwin Rommel, arrived in Libya to support the faltering Italians, launching a seesaw campaign across the desert. Simultaneously, Germany invaded Yugoslavia and Greece in April 1941 to secure its southern flank.

Operation Barbarossa: The Invasion of the Soviet Union

In a dramatic turn of events, Hitler broke the Nazi-Soviet Pact and launched Operation Barbarossa on June 22, 1941. This was the largest military invasion in history. The **Timeline Of The Second World War** is critically shaped by this decision. German forces advanced deep into Soviet territory, encircling millions of soldiers in massive pincer movements. However, they failed to take Moscow before the brutal Russian winter set in. The Red Army, though battered, did not collapse. The war on

the Eastern Front became a horrific war of attrition.

Japan's Pacific Offensive

While Germany was focused on Russia, Japan saw an opportunity to secure its resource needs. The United States, which had been applying economic pressure on Japan, was the primary obstacle.

- **December 7, 1941:** Japan launches a surprise attack on the US naval base at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii.
- **December 8, 1941:** The United States and Britain declare war on Japan.
- **December 11, 1941:** Germany and Italy declare war on the United States.

With this, the conflict truly became a world war. Japan rapidly conquered much of Southeast Asia and the Pacific, including the Philippines, Malaya, Singapore, and the Dutch East Indies.

THE TURNING OF THE TIDE (1942-1943)

This is the most critical phase in the **Timeline Of The Second World War**. The Axis powers reached their maximum territorial extent but then suffered a series of crippling defeats that shifted the strategic momentum permanently.

The Tide Turns in the Pacific

Japan's string of victories was stopped at the Battle of the Coral Sea (May 1942), a naval battle fought entirely by aircraft. More decisively, the Battle of Midway (June 1942) saw the US Navy sink four Japanese aircraft carriers. This one battle crippled Japan's offensive capability. The US then went on the offensive, landing at Guadalcanal in the Solomon Islands, beginning a brutal six-month campaign of island-hopping.

The Tide Turns in North Africa and Europe

In North Africa, British General Bernard Montgomery defeated Rommel's Afrika Korps at the Second Battle of El Alamein (October-November 1942). Days later, American and British forces landed in French North Africa (Operation Torch). Trapped between two armies, the Axis forces in Africa surrendered in May 1943.

The most significant turning point, however, occurred on the Eastern Front. The German Sixth Army was surrounded and destroyed at the Battle of Stalingrad (August 1942 – February 1943). This was a catastrophic defeat for Germany. Later, in July 1943, the largest tank battle in history at Kursk ended with a German retreat. The Red Army began a relentless advance westward.

The Air War and the Holocaust

Throughout this period, the Allies intensified the strategic bombing of German industrial cities. The RAF bombed by night, and the USAAF bombed by day. While controversial, it aimed to destroy German war production and morale.

It is also crucial to note the ongoing horror of the Holocaust. The **Timeline Of The Second World War** is tragically intertwined with the systematic genocide of six million Jews and millions of other victims by the Nazi regime. Camps like Auschwitz-Birkenau functioned as industrial killing centers, a dark shadow behind the military history.

THE COLLAPSE OF THE AXIS (1944-1945)

The final years of the war saw the relentless advance of Allied forces from all sides, leading to the total defeat of the Axis powers.

The Fall of the Third Reich

On June 6, 1944, known as D-Day, Allied forces landed on the beaches of Normandy in France (Operation Overlord), opening a long-awaited Western Front. After heavy fighting, Paris was liberated by late August. By early 1945, the Allies had crossed the Rhine River into Germany.

From the east, the Red Army had driven the Germans out of Poland and the Balkans. In January 1945, they launched a massive offensive that brought them to the gates of Berlin by April. Hitler committed suicide in his bunker on April 30, 1945. Germany surrendered unconditionally on May 8, 1945 (V-E Day).

The War in the Pacific: Island Hopping to Victory

The war against Japan proved to be even more brutal. The US military employed a strategy of "island hopping," bypassing some Japanese strongholds while capturing others to provide airfields for bombing Japan. Battles like those at Iwo Jima (February-March 1945) and Okinawa (April-June 1945) were among the bloodiest of the entire war. Japanese defenders fought with fanatical determination, and kamikaze attacks took a heavy toll on the US Navy.

The Atomic Bombs and Final Surrender

In July 1945, the Allies issued the Potsdam Declaration, calling for Japan's unconditional surrender, but Japan refused. President Harry S. Truman made the decision to use a new weapon of immense power. On August 6, 1945, the **Enola Gay** dropped an atomic bomb on Hiroshima. Three days later, a second bomb was dropped on Nagasaki.

- **August 8, 1945:** The Soviet Union declares war on Japan and invades Manchuria.
- **August 15, 1945:** Emperor Hirohito announces Japan's surrender.
- **September 2, 1945:** Japan formally signs the instrument of surrender aboard the USS Missouri in Tokyo Bay. This date marks the official end of the Second World War.
