## A SAMPLE LOW SODIUM DIET MENU FOR ONE DAY

The following menu provides approximately 1,400 to 1,600 milligrams of sodium, making it ideal for those targeting the recommended daily limit.

Portions can be adjusted based on individual calorie needs.

## Breakfast

### Oatmeal with Berries and Unsalted Almonds

Cook 1 cup of rolled oats with water or unsweetened almond milk. Top with 1 cup of fresh blueberries, 2 tablespoons of unsalted almonds, and a sprinkle of cinnamon. Serve with a small glass of low-sodium vegetable juice or a piece of fresh fruit. Sodium content: approximately 50 milligrams.

## Lunch

### Grilled Chicken Salad with Lemon Vinaigrette

Combine 4 ounces of grilled, skinless chicken breast (seasoned with garlic powder, black pepper, and oregano) with 4 cups of mixed greens, cucumber slices, cherry tomatoes, shredded carrots, and diced avocado. For the dressing, whisk together 2 tablespoons of olive oil, 2 tablespoons of fresh lemon juice, 1 teaspoon of Dijon mustard (look for low-sodium varieties or simply skip it), and a pinch of black pepper. Avoid adding salt. Serve with a side of quinoa. Sodium content: approximately 200 milligrams.

## Afternoon Snack

### Greek Yogurt with Sliced Strawberries

Choose plain, nonfat Greek yogurt (check the label for sodium content; some brands add salt). Top with 1 cup of sliced fresh strawberries and a drizzle of honey or maple syrup. Avoid flavored yogurts, which often contain added sugar and sodium. Sodium content: approximately 60 milligrams.

## Dinner

### Baked Salmon with Roasted Vegetables and Brown Rice

Place a 5-ounce fillet of wild salmon on a baking sheet lined with parchment paper. Season with dill, parsley, paprika, and a squeeze of lemon. Roast at 400°F for 12 to 15 minutes. On a separate sheet, toss chopped broccoli, bell peppers, and zucchini with olive oil, garlic powder, and black pepper. Roast alongside the salmon. Serve with 1 cup of cooked brown rice. Sodium content: approximately 250 milligrams.

## Evening Snack (Optional)

### Herbal Tea and a Small Handful of Unsalted Walnuts

A comforting way to end the day without adding sodium. Sodium content: approximately 5 milligrams.

**Total sodium for the day: approximately 570 milligrams**, leaving plenty of room for any additional sodium that may appear in foods not listed here, such as certain spices or low-sodium condiments.

## TIPS FOR SUCCESS ON A LOW SODIUM DIET MENU

## Read Nutrition Labels Religiously

The single most effective habit you can develop is reading nutrition facts labels. Look for the sodium content per serving and compare products. A food is considered low sodium if it contains 140 milligrams or less per serving. Aim to keep individual items within this range, and be aware that many foods that don't taste salty, such as breakfast cereals and bakery items, can still be high in sodium.
