Folding in the Flour

Sift the self-raising flour over the batter. Using a large metal spoon or a rubber spatula, fold the flour in gently. Use a figure-of-eight motion, cutting through the batter and folding it over itself. Stop as soon as no streaks of flour remain.

Over-mixing at this stage will develop the gluten and deflate all the precious air you have beaten in, leading to a tough, dense cake.

Dividing and Baking

Divide the batter evenly between the two prepared tins. Gently spread it to the edges, creating a slight dip in the center of each if your batter is very thick (this promotes a flat top). Bake for 20-25 minutes. The cakes are done when they are golden brown, spring back when lightly pressed in the center, and a skewer inserted into the middle comes out clean. Turn them out onto a wire rack, remove the parchment paper, and let them cool completely.

CREATING THE PERFECT FILLING AND FINISHING TOUCHES

This is often a sign of under-creaming the butter and sugar, or over-mixing once the flour is added. Make sure your butter is truly soft and you beat it for the full time. When folding, be gentle and swift. Also, double-check that your self-raising flour is within its expiration date.

Can I Freeze the Sponge?

Yes. The unfilled sponges freeze beautifully. Once completely cool, wrap each one tightly in cling film and then in aluminum foil. Freeze for up to 3 months. Thaw at room temperature for a few hours before filling and serving.

VARIATIONS AND PERSONAL TOUCHES
