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THE CASTING THAT SHOCKED HOLLYWOOD: TOM CRUISE IN INTERVIEW WITH THE VAMPIRE

When Anne Rice's beloved gothic novel *Interview with the Vampire* was adapted for the big screen in 1994, the announcement of **Tom Cruise Interview With The Vampire** casting sent shockwaves through the literary

and cinematic worlds. BEHIND THE SCENES: THE MAKING OF A GOTHIC MASTERPIECE

Production on *Interview with the Vampire* was a massive undertaking, with elaborate sets built to recreate 18th-century New Orleans and Paris.

Tom Cruise was deeply involved in the production process, working closely with Neil Jordan on character development and scene blocking. Commercially, the film was a significant success. Opening at number one at the box office, it demonstrated that gothic horror could attract mainstream audiences when anchored by star power and quality production values.
