Lightly spray the tops with oil. Bake at 400°F (200°C) for 15-20 minutes, until golden and cooked through. Serve with a side of sugar-free ketchup or a yogurt-based honey mustard dip.

Hidden Veggie Turkey Meatballs

These tender meatballs are a fantastic way to incorporate finely chopped vegetables. The veggies add moisture and nutrition without a strong, identifiable flavor.

- **Ingredients:** Lean ground turkey, finely grated zucchini (squeezed dry), finely chopped onion, minced garlic, an egg, grated Parmesan, and whole wheat panko breadcrumbs.
- **Method:** Mix all ingredients thoroughly. Form into small, walnut-sized meatballs. Bake on a lined sheet pan at 375°F (190°C) for 18-22 minutes, or brown them in a skillet with a little olive oil. They pair wonderfully with a simple tomato sauce over spaghetti squash or whole grain pasta.

CATEGORY 2: VEGGIE-FORWARD DINNERS

Cauliflower "Mac" and Cheese

A nutritious twist on a comfort food classic. This version uses cauliflower florets as the base, bathed in a creamy, cheesy sauce.

- **Ingredients:** Cauliflower florets, sharp cheddar cheese, milk (or unsweetened almond milk), a small amount of cream cheese, Dijon mustard, and a pinch of nutmeg.
- **Method:** Steam the cauliflower until tender but not mushy. In a saucepan, melt the cream cheese, then whisk in the milk and cheddar until smooth. Add mustard and nutmeg. Pour the sauce over the cooked cauliflower and mix gently. For a crunchy topping, sprinkle with whole wheat breadcrumbs and broil for 2 minutes.

These tacos are naturally sweet, colorful, and packed with fiber and vitamins. They are easy to assemble and make for a fun, hands-on dinner.

- **Ingredients:** Diced sweet potatoes, canned black beans (rinsed and drained), taco seasoning, small corn or whole wheat tortillas.

- **Method:** Toss diced sweet potatoes with olive oil and taco seasoning. Roast at 400°F (200°C) for 20 minutes. Add the black beans to the pan for the last 5 minutes to warm them. Fill the tortillas with the mixture and let kids add their own toppings like shredded lettuce, diced avocado, and a dollop of plain Greek yogurt (a healthy alternative to sour cream).
