TIPS FOR CUSTOMIZING YOUR APPEAL LETTER

Avoid emotional language, anger, or demands. Be polite and respectful. The letter is a formal legal document, not a social media post.

Keep It Concise but Thorough

One page is ideal, but two pages may be necessary if you have many corrective actions or a complex situation. Use short paragraphs and bullet points where appropriate to improve readability.

Include Supporting Documentation

Don't just claim you took a course—prove it. Attach copies of certificates, receipts, and any letters from employers or doctors

that support your case. Label every attachment clearly.

Address the Specific Reason for Suspension
