- 1 large handful of spinach

- 1 tablespoon flaxseed or chia seeds
- 1 scoop plant-based protein powder (optional)

Benefits: The banana provides a creamy texture and natural sweetness. The seeds add healthy omega-3 fatty acids and fiber, which helps to stabilize blood sugar and keep you full longer.

3. The Sunset Juice

This juice is higher in sugar than the Mean Green, making it a good choice for an afternoon pick-me-up or after a workout.

• Ingredients:

- 2 large carrots
- 2 red apples
- 1 large beet (scrubbed clean, root and greens if available)
- 1-inch piece of ginger

Benefits: Beets are known for their ability to lower blood pressure and improve blood flow. Carrots are rich in beta-carotene, which supports eye health and immunity.

BEYOND JUICING: TRANSITIONING TO WHOLE FOOD RECIPES

A common mistake people make is thinking the journey ends when the juice fast is over. The real work begins when you start eating solid food again. The recipes in the next phase are often called "Reboot Recipes" and focus on whole, plant-based foods.

Building a Reboot-Friendly Meal
