Lower Loire (Tours to Angers)

This region is famous for its white wines, particularly Vouvray and Montlouis-sur-Loire, which are produced from Chenin Blanc grapes. The city of Saumur, with its dramatic castle overlooking the river, is a highlight. Western Loire

(Angers to Nantes)

This section marks the transition from the classic châteaux country to a more maritime environment. Nantes is a dynamic, modern city with a rich history as the capital of the Dukes of Brittany. While not technically part of the "garden of France" in the strictest sense, it is often included in broader Loire itineraries. The map shows that the river becomes tidal here, and the landscape is dotted with salt marshes and vineyards producing Muscadet. The Château de Brézé and the Château de la Turmelière are notable stops, but the focus here is more on wine, seafood, and the unique atmosphere of the Atlantic coast.

THE MAJOR CHÂTEAUX AND THEIR LOCATIONS

No discussion of a **Map Of Loire Valley France** is complete without a clear understanding of where the major châteaux are situated. These architectural masterpieces are the main draw for most visitors, and knowing their locations relative to each other can save you hours of driving time.

- **Château de Chambord:** Located northeast of Blois. It is a massive Renaissance palace, a bit isolated but unmissable.

- **Château de Chaumont-sur-Loire:** Overlooking the Loire River near the town of Chaumont. It hosts an annual international garden festival.
- **Château d'Amboise:** In the town of Amboise, on the banks of the Loire. It was a favorite residence of several French kings and contains the tomb of Leonardo da Vinci.
- **Château de Villandry:** West of Tours, famous for its stunning Renaissance gardens, including the famous vegetable garden and ornamental flowerbeds.
- **Château de Saumur:** In the town of Saumur. A dramatic castle perched on a hill, visible from miles away.
- **Château d'Angers:** In Angers. A massive fortress with a distinctive black and white stone appearance, housing the Apocalypse Tapestry.

When using your map, pay attention to the secondary roads (D-roads) that run parallel to the river. These routes are often more scenic and less crowded than the main highways. They also connect many of the smaller, less-known châteaux and villages that can be just as rewarding as the famous ones.

WINE ROUTES AND APPELLATIONS ON THE MAP

Most wineries are happy to welcome visitors, but it is wise to call ahead, especially during the harvest season (September-October).
