4. Education

If you have strong academic achievements or relevant coursework, you can add a bullet point or two. However, for a simple resume, keep it brief. Once you have a few years of work experience, this section moves below the work experience section.

5. Skills

This can be a short list of hard skills (software, languages, certifications) and soft skills (leadership, communication, problem-solving). For a simple resume, a clean bulleted list or a single line of comma-separated terms works best. Avoid using star ratings or progress bars, as these are not ATS-friendly and are less common on simple resumes.

Formatting Your Simple Resume for Maximum Impact

Creating a simple resume is not just about what you say, but how you present it. Formatting plays a critical role in how your information is perceived. Here are some practical tips to ensure your resume looks as good as it reads.

Choose the Right Font

Stick to professional, widely-available fonts. Arial and Calibri are safe choices for a modern look, while Times New Roman and Garamond are excellent for a more traditional feel. Font size should be between 10 and 12 points for body text, and 14 to 16 points for your name. Consistency is key: use the same font throughout the document.

Master Margins and White Space
