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WHERE IS DUDLEY MOORE BURIED? THE FINAL RESTING PLACE OF A BELOVED STAR

When a beloved celebrity passes away, fans often seek a tangible connection to their memory. He passed away at the age of 66 in Plainfield, New Jersey, at a nursing home. The question, then, becomes: where did his physical remains end up? Let us explore the specific location and the meaning behind it.

The Short Answer: Cremation and No Traditional Burial

Many fans assume that a well-known figure like Dudley Moore would have a marked grave in a famous cemetery, perhaps in Hollywood or London. It is the final resting place for many notable figures, but Moore's ashes were scattered in the garden area, not placed in a specific urn niche or headstone. The second scattering site is in his native England, specifically at **St. Paul's Church** in the Covent Garden area of London, known as the “Actors’ Church.” This church is a spiritual home for the British theatre and film community. So, while there is no single address where one can stand directly over Dudley Moore's burial plot, there are two sacred places where his ashes have become one with the earth.

Why No Traditional Grave?

This choice might surprise some, but it aligns with Moore's personality and his circumstances. Moore was known for his modesty and lack of ego off-screen. He often downplayed his fame and struggled with feelings of inadequacy, despite his success. A private scattering ceremony, rather than a grand monument, was more in keeping with his character. Additionally, his health battle with PSP had been deeply personal, and he may have wanted his final act to be simple and free from public spectacle.

Furthermore, his family—especially his wife Nicole Rothschild—honored his request for a low-key farewell. Following his death, a private service was held at the Frank E. Campbell Funeral Home in New York City, attended by close friends such as Liza Minnelli and Sir Ian McKellen. Later, a memorial service was held at St. Paul's Church in London, where his ashes were also scattered. The dual locations symbolize his transatlantic life: born in England, but having made America his home for many years.

Exploring the Two Sacred Sites

GREEN-WOOD CEMETERY, BROOKLYN, NEW YORK

Green-Wood Cemetery is located at 500 25th Street, Brooklyn, NY 11232. It is a National Historic Landmark and a popular destination for history lovers, bird watchers, and fans of notable figures like Leonard Bernstein, Jean-Michel Basquiat, and Charles Ebbets. The Garden of Remembrance, where Dudley Moore's ashes were scattered, is a peaceful area with a central fountain, manicured lawns, and flowering shrubs. Unlike a marked grave, there is no headstone bearing his name. Instead, visitors can feel his presence in the tranquillity of the garden. For those wishing to pay respects, the cemetery offers tours and maps, but they should understand that the location is symbolic, not a precise spot with a plaque.

The decision to have his ashes scattered at Green-Wood was partly practical: Moore lived in the United States for the last decades of his life, specifically in New Jersey. His wife chose Brooklyn as a beautiful and fitting place that was accessible to friends and fans on the East Coast. The cemetery is

open daily, and visitors can walk through the Garden of Remembrance to reflect on the memory of the beloved actor.

St. Paul's Church, Covent Garden, London

St. Paul's Church, commonly known as the Actors' Church, is located at Bedford Street, Covent Garden, London WC2E 9ED. This church has a long tradition of honoring performers and artists. It holds regular services, concerts, and memorials. The garden area contains a memorial bench dedicated to Dudley Moore, and a cherry tree was planted in his honor. The scattering of his ashes here acknowledges his deep roots in British theatre and comedy. He began his career on the London stage, performing at venues like the Establishment Club and with Peter Cook in the West End. Returning part of him to this spiritual home is a beautiful tribute.

Visitors to St. Paul's Covent Garden can sit on the bench, read the inscription, and enjoy the peaceful garden. The church is open to the public. While not a traditional burial plot, it serves as a pilgrimage site for fans who want to honor his memory in the city where his career blossomed. Many fans leave flowers, notes, or even little bottles of booze as a nod to his character Arthur.

Memorials and Tributes Beyond the Burial

Beyond these two scattering sites, Dudley Moore is remembered in other ways that can help answer the question of where to find him. There is a **star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame** at 7000 Hollywood Boulevard, honoring his contributions to motion pictures. His handprints and footprints are also preserved at the TCL Chinese Theatre. Additionally, a bronze bust of his head is displayed at the **Dudley Moore Room** at the **Colchester Institute** in Essex, England, where he once studied music. But for those seeking the physical remains, the two scattering locations are the answer to “Where Is Dudley Moore Buried.”

What About a Headstone?

Because his ashes were scattered, there is no headstone with his name and dates. Some fans mistakenly believe he is buried in a marked grave at Green-Wood because the cemetery does have a section for cremated remains. However, the Garden of Remembrance is a communal area; the ashes are interred in the ground but without individual markers. The cemetery's records do list his name in their database of cremains scattered in the garden. For accurate information, fans can contact Green-Wood's historical department. Similarly, at St. Paul's Covent Garden, the church maintains a book of remembrance but no physical grave.

How to Visit and What to Expect

For fans planning a visit to **Where Is Dudley Moore Buried**, here are practical tips:

- **Green-Wood Cemetery:** Enter through the main gates (enter at 25th Street and 5th Avenue) and ask for the Garden of Remembrance. The cemetery is large, so using a map or GPS is helpful.
