- **Clutch drum replacement:** 0.4–0.6 hours
- **Oil pump replacement:** 0.5–0.8 hours
- **Crank seal replacement (one side):** 0.8–1.2 hours
- **Piston/cylinder replacement (top end):** 1.5–2.5 hours

String Trimmers / Leaf Blowers

- **Spark plug replacement:** 0.1–0.2 hours
- **Air filter replacement:** 0.1 hours

- **Primer bulb replacement:** 0.2–0.3 hours
- **Recoil starter replacement:** 0.3–0.5 hours
- **Clutch replacement (trimmer):** 0.4–0.6 hours

Generators & Pressure Washers

- **Oil change:** 0.2–0.3 hours
- **Air filter replacement:** 0.1–0.2 hours
- **Spark plug replacement:** 0.1–0.2 hours
- **Carburetor overhaul:** 0.6–1.2 hours (often more complex due to mounting)
- **Battery replacement (electric start models):** 0.2–0.3 hours
- **Alternator / charging coil test:** 0.3–0.5 hours
