Winters can be cold and snowy, particularly in Estonia, which experiences temperatures that can drop below -20°C. Summers are mild to warm, with average temperatures ranging from 16°C to 22°C. ### POLITICAL BOUNDARIES AND ADMINISTRATIVE DIVISIONS

These three capitals form a rough triangle on the map, with each city approximately 300 kilometers from the next.

### TRANSPORTATION AND CONNECTIVITY ACROSS THE BALTIC STATES

## Air Travel

Each Baltic capital has an international airport with flights to major European hubs. Tallinn Airport, Riga International Airport, and Vilnius Airport all offer direct connections to cities such as London, Frankfurt, Helsinki, Stockholm, and Warsaw. Riga Airport is the busiest in the region, serving as a hub for the low-cost carrier airBaltic. For travelers visiting the Baltic states from outside Europe, flying into one capital and departing from another is a common and convenient option.

## Ferry and Sea Travel

The Baltic Sea itself provides an important transportation artery. Ferries connect Tallinn with Helsinki (Finland) and Stockholm (Sweden), while Riga has ferry services to Stockholm and other Baltic ports. Klaipėda in Lithuania is a major port with ferry connections to Germany, Sweden, and Denmark. These sea routes make it possible to combine a visit to the Baltic states with travel to Scandinavia, adding another dimension to trip planning.

### CULTURAL AND LINGUISTIC DIVERSITY

## Russian and Other Minority Languages

Due to the Soviet period, Russian is widely spoken across all three Baltic states, particularly among older generations and in urban areas. However, the status of Russian varies by country. In Estonia and Latvia, Russian-speaking minorities are significant, and language policy remains a sensitive
