Common vs. Rare Figurines

Enesco produced millions of Precious Moments figurines over the years. Many were mass-produced for years and are considered common. These include many of the "Happy Birthday" and "I Love You" themed pieces. However, certain figurines—especially retired pieces, limited editions, and those from specific series—are inherently rarer. The scarcity of a piece is a primary driver of its price.

KEY FACTORS THAT DETERMINE YOUR PRECIOUS MOMENTS PRICE

Several specific elements will directly influence the numbers you find in any **Enesco Precious Moments Price Guide**. Paying close attention to these details will make you a more informed collector or seller.

Retirement Status and Discontinued Pieces

When Enesco decides to "retire" a figurine, it means the mold is destroyed, and no more will be produced. This immediately creates scarcity. Retired figurines, especially those that were popular during their production run, often see a significant spike in secondary market value. A common figurine that sold for \$20 retail might be worth \$40 or \$50 after retirement. Conversely, a rare, highly sought-after retired piece can be worth several hundred dollars. Always check if a figurine is retired when looking at a price guide.

Series and Set Completeness

Precious Moments figurines are often part of larger series, such as the "Sweet Moments" series, "Holiday" series (Christmas, Easter, Halloween), or "Bible Stories" series. A single figurine from a series may have a moderate value, but a complete set is often worth significantly more than the sum of its individual parts. For example, a complete nativity scene set can be a major find for a collector and will command a premium price.

Limited Editions and Special Releases

Enesco produced many limited edition (LE) pieces, often numbered and created for specific events or anniversaries. These are typically more valuable than standard production pieces. Club exclusives, convention pieces, and store-specific releases (like those sold only at Hallmark or Disney) are also highly sought after. If you have a limited edition piece, its edition number (e.g., 485/5000) does not usually affect value unless it is a very low number like #1 or a "signed" artist proof.

The Demand Factor

Even among rare pieces, demand drives price. A figurine featuring a common theme like a birthday cake might be less desirable than a figurine depicting a specific, beloved piece of scripture or a rare holiday theme. General market trends also play a role; the overall demand for Precious Moments has fluctuated over the years. Current trends, like a resurgence of interest in nostalgic 1980s and 1990s collectibles, can temporarily increase values for certain pieces.

Identifying Your Figurine Correctly
